this course if designed as an introductory overview to the law enforcement profession in the state of california

this easy to read illustrated text addresses all topics plus learning goals and objectives currently required by post for the pc 832 training course it is the consistent 832 pc training book since 1986 and is updated yearly it ensures uniform exposure to post required material and gives students a reference handbook this text not only reduces the need for supplemental handouts but it also provides study assignments with a comprehensive glossary and complete index

this text includes all required subject matter and performance objectives prescribed by the california commission on peace officer standards and training and required by california penal code section 832 the text contains two parts an arrest course and a firearms course sections of the arrest course focus on professional orientation community relations legal issues and the law probable cause obstruction of justice constitutional rights and reasonable and deadly force rules of evidence communications investigations and arrest and control sections of the firearms course cover firearms safety handgun familiarization weapon cleaning and storage firearms shooting principles and handgun combat shooting on the firearms range

the material contained in this document is taken from the post basic course a committee made up of reserve and basic course trainers developed this material to provide uniformity in reserve training on a statewide basis the material contained in this document minimally covers the requirements for pc 832 level iii reserve training and is intended as a guideline for coordinator s and instructor s use

the purpose of this fifth edition guide is to offer organizational operational and technical guidelines relevant to the delivery of the regular basic course including guidance in the development of internal academy management policies it represents the collective development of post staff and basic academy directors and coordinators the regular basic course learning domain instructional system is a complex arrangement of instructional units learning needs learning objectives training and testing methodologies and mandated hours supported by student workbooks the system is developed and maintained by the contributions of law enforcement practitioners and trainers from throughout the state

this summarizes a final report regarding penal code section 832 submitted to the california commission on peace officer standards and training post as specified in the request for proposal the project has two phases 1 to develop a revised course establish performance objectives for future p c 832 training and 2 to develop training materials for the recommended course this study began in july 1981 and ended april 1982

when it comes to the defensive use of firearms the skill of not being shot is at least as important as the skill of shooting moving to cover and shooting from cover should be a constant part of handgun drilling but unfortunately most exercises don t emphasize this aspect of defense in a perfect world the first shots a beginner fires would be from behind cover seeking cover while drawing or firing should be an instinct you are training yourself every time you handle a gun and if you stand out in the open when shooting drills you are training yourself to stand out in the open when returning fire an immobile and easy target as is very often observed in law enforcement shootings the antidote is to shoot from cover from the very outset and keep it a constant part of your training as law enforcement training shifts to this paradigm they observe that officers who come up for qualification are uneasy firing in the open they instinctively prefer to shoot from behind cover when it is available there is very little use of cover in these drills which is why i mention it here they can however be adapted it is up to you to give yourself the kind of training you want to have

this document contains the legal reference background certification information and course outline for each of these prescribed courses the course outlines contained in this manual provide basic guidelines for lesson plan preparation and course presentation

this book untangles the components of police education and advocates a robust community based training model with significant civilian oversight the recommended approach recognizes that the citizenry needs to be included in the provision of basic police education for it is they who must both support and be served by their police the police must be role models for society demonstrating that freedom and rights come with obligations both to the community as a whole and to individuals in need within that community ultimately the quality of police training and the public s safety depend not only on the leadership of police executives as well as the quality of educational institutions and police candidates but also on the building of a community s trust in its police the issues of police recruitment education and retention have greater consequence in an era when protests and other signs of negativity surround law enforcement several incidents including most notably george floyd s murder by police have sparked new training initiatives regarding police de escalation and community engagement at the same time the proliferation of gun violence and a contentious political climate have led some officers to refrain from undertaking proactive types of policing in this context reform of the police education system is urgent this book examines police training at all levels of government local regional state and federal in addition citizen participation programs including the role of the media and programs for furthering law related education lre are highlighted the proposed police education model recognizes that ordinary members of the american public need to contribute to the provision of basic police education for it is they who must both support and be served by their police the focus is on teaching a guardian style of policing at the local level police education would combine higher education necessary practical proficiencies and intensive field experiences through a gradual level of greater responsibility likely extending over a 2 plus year period for trainees with less than a year of previous college credits this book will be of interest to a wide range of audiences such as law enforcement professionals and trainers including those in executive development programs in police departments community leaders scholars and policy experts who specialize in policing concerned citizens and students of criminal justice especially those interested in police organization and management criminal justice policy and the historical development of police

this book serves 3 types of readers the first type of reader is one who is going to read this book as study material for the ppo qualified manager exam as such the content was based on the exam outline for ppos for the second type of reader this book serves are those considering opening a security company or those who are managing a company and who want a guide on the current industry standards this book will explore the basic fundamentals of owning and operating a security company in california the third type of reader is that of the attorney who is investigating or prosecuting a negligence case involving a private security company the intent of this book is to serve as one of the primary legal treatises on private security standards although the book contains practice questions the reader must understand these questions are not the same questions on the state exam neither the same or exact content in the state exam remember no particular author or entity has legal access to the bsis questions

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
